Painting brightens up lodge

GLENMORGAN artist Carol McCormack found a new way to brighten up the lives of those undergoing cancer treatments and living at the Toowoomba Olive McMahon Lodge - she painted a 55m long frieze to hang in the corridor.

Ms McCormack said she, like everyone else, knew friends and family who had needed cancer treatment and knew finding accommodation could be hard when you lived away from the big cities.

She said when she heard about the lodge, she had wanted to support it.

"I wanted to give something back," she said.
